Meet the UT Advising Community: Ashleigh Powers

Ashleigh Powers has served as the Coordinator of Advising for the Psychology major since January 2013.



How did you get involved with academic advising?

Prior to coming to UT, I was on faculty at a small college in Mississippi. Academic advising was only one part of my job there, but it was the part I loved most. When we moved to Tennessee in 2013, I jumped at the chance to work full time in academic advising at UT!

What do you like most about working with students in the College of Arts & Sciences?

I love the opportunity to work with students to craft degree plans that help them meet their life goals. I've always loved puzzles, and putting together a good degree plan feels a lot like working one to me. I also really enjoy helping students see all the possibilities a liberal arts degree can offer them. Their major is rock solid, but it's only one piece of their degree, and there's so much more they can bring to the table. It's great when students recognize that. I also love the interconnectedness of our

job. I've formed great relationships with faculty and a lot of the support offices on campus. I'm a team player, and I love being a part of such a tight network of student resources.

What qualities and characteristics do you think are important for an academic advisor to be successful?

I think active listening skills are paramount. That's kind of clichéd, I know. We all value listening to our students. What I'm always trying to get better at is the kind of listening that is responsive, that shows students that their ideas have real uptake. I try to mirror back as much of what I'm hearing as I can when we're talking, and of course, reflect those things in my notes. I think compassion and a healthy sense of humor are also really important qualities to bring to advising. No two days are ever the same, and students bring us a lot of strange situations. There can sometimes be a lot of stress for the student and for us as advisors. It's important for me to connect to the emotional elements of the job—to be able to empathize when the situation calls for it, and also to recognize the lighter side of the appointment when that's most useful.

Outside of work, what hobbies or interests do you have?

I like to spend time at home with my family and friends. As long as people visited me, I would probably be perfectly happy as a hermit. Game night with friends is my idea of a great time. My son, Gregory, is the most adorable almost-five-year-old on the planet, and I devote a lot of my energy to him. He's playing baseball this spring, and I'm looking forward to that. I sing soprano in the church choir. I'm also a process knitter (I don't really care what I'm making; I just have to have something to do with my hands at all times).
